GRANT-IN-AID

New Directions and advancement marked the cornerstones of growth as the Wisconsin Arts Board completed its third full year of operation June 3, 1977. Public and artist response to programs made these cornerstones strong building blocks for the arts in Wisconsin.

The Board's programs advanced to respond to the arts needs expressed in applications for grants-in-aid from 483 organizations, institutions and individuals, half again the number of requests in the previous fiscal year. In total they requested \$1.4 million, compared to \$909,000 in 1976. Federal funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Arts Board's sole source of program funds increased only \$1,000 to \$197,000 during the same period. These funds provided for 107 matching grants in aid and fellowships throughout the state. In turn, those grantees raised or donated \$500,000 in cash, services and materials.

In all 1.1 million Wisconsin citizens and 8,500 Wisconsin artists viewed or participated in live programs in 71 counties including over 400 tour events, with numerous festivals and radio or television broadcasts reaching persons in all corners of the state.

Wisconsin citizens, artists and laypersons examined the needs of their communities and their state and approached the Arts Board for some of the necessary building blocks of diversified programs.

The needs in Wisconsin included touring programs in dance, theatre, and music, by such companies as the Milwaukee Ballet, Friends Mime Theatre, the Milwaukee Symphony, Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestra, and the Florentine Opera; a documentary film of the founder of the Suzuki music education method, Shinichi Suzuki, during a visit to Stevens Point; support to the Great Lakes Film Festival; a dance residency by choreographer Rika Burnham with Dancecircus, Ltd. in Milwaukee; partial support of a hand-printed, hand-bound book of fables by James Cortese of Madison; aid to a special exhibition at the Bergstrom Art Center in Neenah/Menasha; and fellowships to five writers and five visual artists of exceptional promise in Wisconsin, and myriad other projects of scope and merit.

The Wisconsin Arts Board grew in 1977. It advanced to the needs of Wisconsin artists and audiences and it continues to build cornerstones of support for artists and audiences across the state.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In 1976-77, the Wisconsin Arts Board also administered five additional special programs: Artists-in-Schools, Community Arts Development, Dance Touring, Wisconsin Concrete Sculpture Park, Dairyland Graphics (Phase II), Statewide Simulcasts of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, and a visual artist residency at the Federal prison in Oxford.

Artists-in-Schools, Community Development and Dance Touring are ongoing programs for the Board, all funded in part by the National Endowment for the Arts and local sponsors in the state. The Wisconsin Concrete Sculpture Park was begun as a special project to preserve the naive sculpture in concrete and glass by Wisconsin artist Fred Smith of Phillips, funded through a cooperative endeavor of federal, state and local government and private foundations and corporations. Dairyland Graphics completed its second and final phase of a pilot mural program in rural communities, also funded in part by the National Endowment for the Arts with local community participants and donated supplies and materials.

ARTISTS-IN-SCHOOLS

Artists-in-Schools is an ongoing program of the Wisconsin Arts Board in conjunction with the National Endowment for the Arts. The program's objective is to involve professional artists, students, parents and teachers in the cooperative effort of developing and enriching students' sensitivity to and understanding of the arts. It also provides an experience that encourages further arts programming and integration of the arts into the regular school activities, and, ultimately, the community.

During the 1976-77 school year, A-I-S programs in poetry, film/video and the visual arts occurred in over 60 Wisconsin schools, twice as many as the previous fiscal year.

COMMUNITY ARTS DEVELOPMENT

In its second year, the Community Development Program of the Wisconsin Arts Board provided \$30,000 in project and program aid to state community arts agencies, again nearly twice the amount awarded in the previous fiscal year. Funds for this program were received by the Arts Board through a special grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

EXPANDING THE ARTS COMMUNITY, a two-day conference sponsored by the Arts Board in cooperation with the Association of College, University and Community Arts Administrators and the School of Fine Arts, University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, was held on October 1 and 2, 1976, to kick off community program planning.

The conference consisted of presentations and workshops designed to assist community and educational arts sponsors with philosophical and practical considerations in the development of local arts activities. Guest speakers included six leading arts administrators from across the country. Packets of related materials were given to each conference participant, and the conference was attended by more than seventy organizational representatives from all regions in the state.

Community arts development leaders utilized an outstanding opportunity to meet each other and discuss issues, compare and contrast methods and activities.

GRANTS to community arts agencies provided the incentive to organize, to expand the base of participation, develop accountable management systems, and become involved in long range planning for the arts. Agencies may have autonomy when designing their program, or may work closely with the Arts Board staff to develop a functional agency structure and plan services and activities.

A total of \$27,744 in grants were awarded to sixteen Wisconsin communities for arts development programs. These included an inter-arts series (films, performances, visual arts events), art fairs and festivals, audience development and arts information programs, challenge grants to stimulate local funding and funds for staff and operational support of arts agencies.

DANCE TOURING PROGRAM

In a combined sponsorship with the National Endowment for the Arts, Affiliated State Arts Agencies of the Upper Midwest, and the Wisconsin Arts Board, the Dance Touring Program provided state organizations and institutions in ten communities with the opportunity to have fifteen professional dance companies in residence reaching 30,000 audience members in 1976-77.

The residencies varied in length from two and a half days to three weeks and included public performances, community workshops, in-school lecture demonstrations and master classes. Local sponsors determine the nature of the residency through choice of company and discussions with the company about activities most suited to particular community needs and interests. Federal subsidy of one-third of the company fee is available from the Endowment for sponsoring organizations.

During the 1976-77 fiscal year, fifteen professional residencies were sponsored in Wisconsin. The sponsoring organizations and institutions and the companies in residence were: the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Don Wagoner and Dancers, Lar Lubovitch Dance Company, and Utah Repertory Dance Theatre; University of Wisconsin-River Falls, 5+2 Dance Company and Bhaskar Dances of India; University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, Mordine and Company, and Don Redlich Dance Company; Milwaukee Performing Arts Center, City Center Joffrey Ballet and Nikolais Dance Theatre; Racine Unified Schools, Raymond Johnson Dance Company; St. Norbert College, DePere, 5+2 Dance Company; Viterbo College, La Crosse, Ballet Folk of Moscow; University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, Luigi's Jazz Dance Company; and the Wausau Performing Arts Foundation and University of Wisconsin-Green Bay both sponsored residencies by the Hartford Ballet.

WISCONSIN CONCRETE SCULPTURE PARK - PHILLIPS, WISCONSIN

One of the most exciting projects for the Wisconsin Arts Board was the salvaging and restoration of the works of naive sculptor Fred Smith of Phillips, Wisconsin.

Upon the death of Mr. Smith in early 1976, the monumental cement and glass sculptures of this truly free-spirited artist were scheduled for demolition.

The Kohler Foundation of Kohler, Wisconsin, purchased the property on which the sculptures stand and with Arts Board and National Endowment for the Arts grants, the process of restoration, conservation and development of a county park was begun. Wisconsin artists Don and Sharron Howlett were hired to restore the priceless works and to plan the park.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources aided in moving the sculptures from sites around Price County to the park setting for restoration.

With the combined dedicated efforts of Federal, state, county, and local governments and private industry and foundations, these sculptures will be preserved and will become a Price County park.

DAIRYLAND GRAPHICS

The Dairyland Graphics project continued to develop as national network television and national magazines featured the program as a model rural arts project in America. A two-year pilot project of rural barn murals, the project involved area residents in the design and execution of a large, highly visible mural reflecting the heritage and culture of their region of Wisconsin. Six murals were completed in the summer of 1977, with paint donated by Sears, Roebuck & Co., to complement the six murals created during Phase I.

Six professional artists from the selected rural areas guided local youths in designing and painting their murals. In this manner rural residents became acquainted with professional artists and their work and the artist became involved in the community.

The Wisconsin Department of Tourism designed and released a guide brochure on the program with directions for motorists to each mural site. The brochure has been and continues to be distributed throughout the state.

As a final touch to the Dairyland Graphics, the Arts Board put together the "how-to" Mural Manual on organizing and producing a community mural. This manual has been distributed by request to a number of states as artists and community leaders in other states are inspired by the success of this program.

STATEWIDE SIMULCASTS

Distribution of our state's major artistic resources to as broad an audience as possible is one of the Board's priorities. To fulfill that responsibility, the Board utilized Wisconsin's superb public television and radio network for the first time to bring the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra into homes throughout the state. In a cooperative effort with the Educational Communications Board, Channel 10, Milwaukee, the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, and the musician's union, five simulcasts of performances by the orchestra were offered to 95 per-cent of Wisconsin homes. The simulcasts also were beamed into Minnesota for broadcasting into the northwestern section of our state.

ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE
FEDERAL CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION
OXFORD, WISCONSIN

In fiscal year 1977, the Arts Board, through a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, and in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Prisons, supported an artist residency at the Federal Correctional Institution in Oxford, Wisconsin. This residency was one of five pilot projects focusing on the arts in prisons throughout the United States designed to aid inmates in making more creative use of their leisure time in the correctional institution.

Don Turner, a visual artist who has exhibited his metal point work nationally, created a course of study and worked as the resident artist. Many of the inmates had never had any type of formal art instruction, so he developed an innovative, story-telling method to introduce inmates to concepts of design, colors and theme and then worked closely with them as their work progressed.

The program was voluntary and approximately twenty of the 500 Oxford inmates were consistent attendees during the year. Another twenty to thirty "dropped in" for varying lengths of time. It was notable that, of the twenty students who attended almost daily, many developed artistically to the point where they exhibited completed works in art galleries and shopping centers around the state, as well as selling a few! Also, there were observable changes in behavior of inmates who had previously had some degree of difficulty in adapting to the prison's rules and environment.

The National Endowment for the Arts has since moved its funding support to five other correctional facilities, but the success of this pilot program has persuaded Federal Correctional Institution administrators to continue the Oxford project. Don Turner has stayed as the resident artist, and this initiative is an excellent example of Federal/state cooperation.
