General recurring themes/questions:

- How to make up for lost revenue from cancelled shows, events, venue rental
- Can we encourage funders to offer aid specifically for operating costs vs. programming
- Subsidies for technology to be able to share content virtually?
- How long should we be planning on closure realistically many wondering about summer, some rescheduling things for the fall
- Template or example language for asking people to turn tickets to cancelled shows/events into donations vs. requesting refund
- What can I ask my board to do?
- How to proceed with school programming stay in touch with students/families? Offer 'make-up' programming?
- Freelance and independent artists literally have ZERO income for March, April, May, beyond?...
- How can orgs continue to support artists/contractors what's the best method? Furlough, layoffs, unemployment, etc. Ability to pay folks at least 50 cents on the dollar, or some fraction of the contracts they were already entered into?
- Many recent event auction items are now void... ideas for how to make up for that?
- Is there a standard boilerplate that we can draw from (local, national) for talking points about supporting the arts in these times?

• Concerns for re-grantors will be addressed with WAB officials

- Get creative with fundraising
- Get even more creative about how to continue to share your work/content or continue programs remotely

- Events that encourage social distancing and getting outside are great (like the Farm Art DTour)

- Fox Cities Community Foundation just announced emergency operating funds those in that area, check it out those who are not, what could we learn from them to take back to our community foundations/other funders?

 - Lectures and workshops had to be postponed.
 - Income is not stable at the moment
 - Mends clothes for money as well.
 - o Has a strong following on Instagram (@heidi.parkes) 11K followers
 - Could ask for support from followers
- Jenny Bot and Laura
 - o Had to close the storefront location of the book center
 - Mostly a community center, so many of their communities have been displaced.
 - o NPS after school arts programming have been closed because schools have closed.
 - Worried for the students and staff.
 - Also, performance-based exhibits.
 - Many had to be postponed or cancelled.
 - Trying to build a new website
 - Trying to find a way for artists to teach online
 - o Concerned for the mental and emotional health for artists, students, and community members.
 - Economic impacts are huge.
 - Okay for now, but they know it will be bad in a few months.
 - Also, using new technology will cost money they cannot afford.
- Anne Katz
 - Working on advocating with people and talking to state legislatures that artists and small businesses are going to be taken care of.
 - Also tracking the negative impacts of the pandemic
 - \$350,000 lost from negative impacts.
 - 71 Wisconsin orgs and 24 million orgs nationally have been impacted negatively.

o Trying to push out as much information as possible.

- SBA low interest loans
- Unemployment compensation
 - Freelance workers cannot apply for unemployment compensation.

Jeff Sweeney

- o Contracts are doing well.
- o How soon can we get a concert launched? What will that look like? How will that happen?
- Trying to bring people together.
 - Making 1 minute videos of the Mable to post online for community members.

Eva

- Contacted National Organization for Arts and Health.
- Was in the beginnings of launching new projects and working with new artists.
 - Are putting videos up online as well.
 - Also trying to bring people together.
- o Implementing a private Facebook page for students to post videos of them learning guitar for feedback from instructors.
- Possibility of commissioning a piece with other classical guitar groups and hopefully put in on live after the pandemic ends.
- o Also wants to partner with poets to put this experience in written words.

- Arts Education is becoming worrying
 - Can't access tools, equipment, and studios in order to study their discipline.

Anne Katz

- Endowments of \$20,000 or less are not really donating right now.
- Struggling raising money for the arts over health right now.

Tom T

- o If arts organizations are receiving a grant, call the granter and ask if they can use the money for operational purposes.
 - Usually the grants are small, so they would be able to use them to pay for rent, possibly.

Taylor

- Just trying to find a way to stay in touch with people.
 - Heavily using social media to achieve this goal.

 - Everything has stopped as of right now.
 - Trying to get filmmakers together to collaborate online.
 - Hard because this is an in-person type of art.

 - Saint Cray Valley Foundation
 - Community Foundation
 - Fundraiser and grant maker
 - Trying to fundraise for an emergency relief fund.
 - Speaker to artists about lost revenue
 - Learning how to be flexible with all of the grants.
 - May let grantees use the money for general operations
 - Also more flexibility with grant reporting
- Robin
 - o Photo Midwest
 - Volunteer Org
 - Does classes, exhibits, and interest groups.

- Cancelled events and classes are on hold.
- Considering zoom as a way to do classes.

Joelle Worm

- Concerned about the narratives of "cancelled" and "stopped."
 - Wants to shift the narrative when communicating with others.
- Reliant on contractual income.
- o Important to tell funders how you are continuing your work.
 - Many people are doing events, classes, etc., online over social media.
- o Important to keep money flowing
- o Trying to participate in multiple groups to keep connections up.
- Also trying to find resources for people and artists struggling with mental health issues during this crisis.

George T

- You also have to think about how you have to maintain people paying for content online,
 - Don't want people to take advantage of artists by saying online content is free.

Karen G

- Don't stop fundraising!
 - Multiple opportunities to remind people to support artists and how they can support them.
- Remind people there is value in what artists are creating online right now.'

Jeff Sweeney

- Working on how soon they can get a concert out.
 - Also working on what they are going to do and events they are putting on once the pandemic is over.

• Carrie Van Hallgren

- o APT
- Reliant on people on coming to the theatre for income.
- Have around 100 artists contracted
 - What happens when they have to open 1 or 2 months late?
- Looking at opportunities to deliver content digitally.
- Concerned for the summer season. Don't know when the pandemic will end
- Also worried for the economic impact on the community.
 - The APT brings business and revenue to other local businesses.

Brent Budsberg

- Milwaukee Artist and Exhibition Design
 - Have seen a lot of their projects stopping.
 - \$99,000 in revenue they might potentially lose.
 - Trying to figure out new content they can do online.
 - Also trying to figure out how to approach client and keep in contact with them.
 - They need work from clients, but they cannot provide work right now.
- Fellowship Art Grant

 Whoever gets the grant this year has the opportunity to help guide people right now in terms of providing new content and bring communities and artists together.

Tina Weiss

- Milwaukee Kids from Wisconsin
 - Have a tour season planned already
 - 36 performers are coming in May to start learning their parts for the show.
 - Getting phone calls from people and other performers asking if the shows/tour is being cancelled.
 - o Worried performers might drop out.
 - Good connections with students from the schools.
 - The students are doing video bios to post online for more content.
 - Hometown Arts Collaborative
 - Lots of workshops for people
 - Strong connections with community resources
 - Has marketing ready to go.
- o Karen (Tips)
 - Don't keep adding to marketing. Cannot predict where things are headed right now.
 - Possibly video the prep for the tours and shows. Share the videos on social media for more content.

Santiago

- Artist and Educator in Milwaukee
 - Trying to use this time positively
 - More time to get back into the studio
 - Important to realize we are part of a much larger community.
 - We need to help each other right now.

 - Artist and Educator in Milwaukee
 - Works with the Grilled Cheese Grant Program

 - Cannot do social distancing for this org. Need to practice together.
 - Talking about the possibilities of cancelling or not.
 - Trying to stick together with other groups.
 - Keeping alliances strong right now.

 - Working with a multi-disciplinary facility.

- o Also presents a summer festival for June 13th.
- Learning that cancelling and postponing things is a lot of work.
 - Interested in how to keep generating content online and keep revenue going.

 - Gives people an opportunity to go outside while still being safe.

As an independent artist running 2 collectives, the financial pull is mainly the potential loss of income from teaching. It is overwhelming to do a great amount of online teaching and now the potential cancellations of CODC spring shows and Marquette U's spring show. CODC lives on ticket sales and small donations, as well as teaching income. We are hoping to keep our 15th Anniversary concert in Sept. This is a stressful time on many levels. Connecting at this time, and hearing other points of view is so helpful.
